You could probably also trade him some farm produce to pay for the gate.



RESEARCH FOR THE NEXT KENNEDY BOOK "The Upper Ormond Kennedys – Their claims to Tipperary soil?"

Last month we said that by calculating and summarising the various holdings in the Civil Survey it could be seen that Rory O'Kennedy of Killowney held more land than Daniel O'Kennedy of Ballintotty.

We can now add the following:

While it may seem from reading the Civil Survey entries that Daniel is the largest landowner, calculation and totalling of the amounts of land in the portions held by each reveal that Rory held 1371 acres which is more than Daniel who held 973 acres. A separate Rory Kennedy of Rapla and Ballinaclogh held 872 acres mostly in Ballinaclogh and Rapla. A further differentiation arises when the combined values of the various holdings are compared.

The result indicates that, while he held the least amount of land, Rory of Ballinaclogh held the most valuable land.

WHAT WAS THE POPULATION IN UPPER ORMOND IN 1821 AND 1831?

The following table shows population growth in some areas and decline in others. However, in total the population of Upper Ormond remained stable over the ten year period. It appears that population changes were more in the nature of a redistribution within the borders of Upper Ormond rather than significant growth or decline.

The Civil Survey of 1654 estimates that there were 28,701 plantation acres of land in the Barony of Upper Ormond. This provides an average of approximately 1.3 acres per person in 1821/31.

Kennedys can be calculated to have owned 8,962 plantation acres of land in Upper Ormond from the information in the Civil Survey. This equates to 31% of the land in the barony. The

Census of 1659 lists 411 families in this barony of which there were 72 Kennedy families. This averages 124 acres per Kennedy family in 1659 compared with the overall average of 70 acres for all Upper Ormond families in 1659. BY Griffiths Valuation c.1850, Kennedys owned virtually no land in Upper Ormond.

THE NAME ANDREW KENNEDY IN UPPER ORMOND

A search of the Baptism Registers for Toomyvara, Kilmore and Templederry provides the following information on the occurrence of the name Andrew Kennedy.

A REQUEST FROM KIRK WARREN IN CAMBODIA

Kirk is from Castlemaine, Victoria Australia and is currently working in Cambodia. He would love to connect with any Kennedy's remotely connected to his Grandmothers family.

My grandmother (on my father's side) was Mabel Kennedy from 38 New Street, Carrick-on-Suir, Ireland. She was born on 8/4/1896. Her Father was, James Patrick Kennedy born around the year 1864, in Tipperary Town, Co. Tipperary. His father was also called James Kennedy.

James Patrick Kennedy's profession was clerk of the Petty Sessions Court in the town of Carrick-on-Suir in south Co. Tipperary, where he must have moved on gaining appointment in the local court service. James served as clerk of the Petty Sessions in Carrick-on-Suir from at least the 1890s until his retirement in the 1920s. On 27th January in the year 1891,

James Kennedy married Ida Margaret Dean (sometimes also spelt Deane), the daughter of George and Kate Dean, who were from the town of Waterford. George Dean was a jeweller. The Dean family may also have been originally from Co. Tipperary, as in the year 1824 a Celia Dean of Cashel had a 'china and glass' shop on the main street of the town.

My Grandfather Victor Reginald Warren married Mabel Catherine Kennedy, daughter of James Patrick Kennedy & Dean, on the 23 February 1919 in St Mary's Clapham Park Rd. Clapham London. My Grandfather had been a German prisoner of war. How he met Mabel in London is unknown. Why Mabel was in London is also unknown other than she was living with an Auntie. Mabel had three brothers. George, James and William.

Her brother Bill visited her in Australia. He eventually settled in Paraguay in South America. I have his old shillelagh. Towards the end of her life my Grandmother lived in a granny flat at the back of our house. I saw her a lot but unfortunately never knew she spoke the Gaelic. For some reason she never celebrated her Irishness or talked about Ireland. She did retain Irishness at her core though. I recall one morning she came into the kitchen of our house all flustered. She stated that the Banshee had visited her during the night and her brother had died. Later that day we received a telegram from Paraguay. Bill was indeed dead.

My father also did not celebrate his Irishness and he was called Dermot Kennedy Warren. Who knows why not.

I however have had an attraction to Irish music and culture all my life. Irish music and folk festivals have been a constant. During my twenties I could be found most times when drinking at the legendary Dan O'Connell hotel in Melbourne. As a Catholic I attended Parade College the first Irish Christian Brothers School in Australia. So Irishness has been at the corner of my eye my whole life.

If you have any information about Kirk's Kennedy ancestors It would be very much appreciated.
