Dear fellow Kennedy clan members,


My name is Fiona Hyslop and I'm the daughter of Lawrence Kennedy, who was born in 1937 in Edinburgh. I do not know my father, but through information learned about him from my mother together with various Ancestry DNA cousin matches, I have been able to identify him in the Scottish records and in the process, have traced my Kennedy roots to County Clare, Ireland, as you can see from my tree.

Not knowing who my father is or was has been a huge hole in my identity. However, having learned that I am part of the Kennedy clan, I finally feel like I belong somewhere, and for the first time in many years I feel a sense of peace in my heart. As such, I am keen to learn more about my Irish Kennedy ancestors, and to find out whether I have any close living relatives who would like to get in touch, or even my father if he is still alive, although I am not holding out much hope of this. He would be 83 now.



More from Irish History by Pat Kennedy, Garnafanna, Toomevara.

Tudor Ireland.



At the onset of the Tudor rule in Ireland The Pale, (an area around Dublin) was ruled by the Earl of Kildare Garrett Mór Fitzgerald, as Lord Deputy only of the Pale, though his influence covered most of Leinster. He created alliances with most of the old English and Gaelic Chieftains through marriage.

The Parliament, in Dublin, was sympathetic to the Yorkist remnants who still posed a threat to Henry V11. Two of those Yorkists, Lambert Simmel and Perkin Warbeck made their way to Ireland. Edward Poyning arrived in Ireland as Lord Deputy in 1494 and stayed until 1496. He instigated Poyning's Law, which made Irish the Parliament subservient to the English Parliament. However a conquest of Ireland was not considered feasible at this time so Garrett Mór was allowed to continue as before. Garrett More was killed in a skirmish with the O'Moore's and was succeeded by his son Garrett Óg- an equally capable ruler.

Times were changing however - the Butler's who were sworn enemies of the Fitzgeralds plotted constantly for his downfall. Henry VIII, sent the Earl of Surrey to Ireland IN 1520 as Lord Deputy, this was the start of Henry's interest in Ireland. A policy of conquest and plantation was rejected as not achievable, so in its stead a policy of "Surrender, and Regrant" was instigated - this entailed the landed Irish having to surrender their lands and receiving it back from the King.

Garrett Og was coming under extreme pressure from the Butler and the English faction in Dublin. He was called to London by the King on a pretence and was imprisoned in the Tower. A false report that he died, caused his son known as Silken Thomas to rebel .He was soon defeated, captured, and sent to the Tower with five uncles all of whom were executed in 1537. This ended the Kildare supremacy. The rising had little or no support and showed the majority of the Irish regarded their country as a papal fief held by the crown of England in virtue of Pope Adrian's donation.

Thomas Cromwell's policy on the reformation had little effect on Ireland outside the pale and the Leinster region, except the dissolution of the Abbeys. An act of supremacy was passed in 1537 making Henry head of the Church in Ireland. Ireland remained "Catholic without the Pope"

Before the end of Henry's reign1547, forty Chiefs and Lords had submitted - some received titles.

Conn O' Neill, one of the most powerful accepted the title " Earl of Tyrone". No one in Ireland accepted the new religious situation. The pressure was on the Irish and would continue for another one hundred and fifty years.

Refusing to be part of the Reformation was probably the most defining episode in Irish history.

The Pope decided to keep Ireland Catholic at all costs. Alone in northern Europe, Ireland remained a Catholic Country. As Europe was divided along religious lines, Ireland was then and in the future seen as a threat to England.

Irish Naming Conventions

Many of us trying to connect people many generations back are helped on our way by having an awareness of the Irish naming tradition. This has been explained in detail by Brian Patrick in "The Story of the Irish Kennedys" but I'm including it in this newsletter for members who may not have come across it before.

- First son usually named for the father's father.
- Second son usually named for the mother's father.
- Third son usually named for the father.
- Fourth son usually named for the father's eldest brother.
- First daughter usually named for father's mother.
- Second daughter usually named for mother's mother
- Third daughter usually named for mother
- Fourth daughter usually named for mother's oldest sister.

Note use of the word "usually" – one can't completely rely on the above but it can prove to be a very helpful guide.

180 Year Round Trip.


